Project title: UHI Evaluation of the Community Link Worker Scheme in Highland

Research department/team: Division of Rural Health and Wellbeing, University of the Highlands and Islands (UHI) and NHS Highland Public Health.

Invitation

Thank you for taking time to read this information. We would like to invite you to take part in a research study about the Community Link Worker (CLW) Scheme being carried out by the University of the Highlands and Islands (UHI). Before making any decision, it is important that you understand why the research is being done and what you will be asked to do. Please read the following information and feel free to contact us if anything is unclear or if you would like further information.

Why is the research study taking place?

The GP contract includes a commitment to embedding community link workers (CLWs) within Scotland's Primary Care system. CLWs will refer patients to a range of local, nonclinical support services, often provided by the community and voluntary sector. This type of referral is often known as a "social prescription". The CLWs will spend time with patients who have a non-clinical need and connect them with activities and groups within their community that could help improve their health and wellbeing. The aim of the research is to evaluate the Community Link Worker Scheme. We will do this by collecting the experiences of a range of patients outlined below:

- 1. People who were referred to the CLW and have attended an initial appointment with the CLW.
- 2. People who were referred to the CLW but decided not to attend an appointment with them.
- 3. People with have seen their GP for a non-clinical need within the last 12 months but have not been referred to a CLW.

We are interested in hearing about these different experiences with the aim of assessing the impact of both taking part and not taking part in the Scheme. We will look at whether the project is effective and whether it could be improved in any way.

Why have I been asked to take part?

You have been asked to take part because you are a patient at one of the participating GP practices in the CLW Scheme but you have not been referred to a CLW by your health care professional.

Do I have to take part?

No. It is up to you whether to take part in this research. You are free to withdraw at any time without giving a reason and without any consequences. If you decide not to take part, it will not affect the healthcare provided to you by your GP surgery.

If I agree to take part, what will I have to do?

Your doctor's practice will ask if you are interested in taking part in the research. If you are, you will be asked to complete two online questionnaires: a baseline questionnaire and then a second one 12 weeks after completing the first (follow-on questionnaire). You can either complete a paper copy of the questionnaire you can access the questionnaire online.

At the end of the questionnaire, you will be asked whether you would like to also be interviewed by a member of the research team about your experiences. If you would like to be interviewed there are instructions for providing your contact details at the end of the questionnaire. A researcher will then contact you to give you information about the interview process and answer any questions. If you wish to go ahead, the researcher will arrange a convenient time to talk to you about your experiences by phone or video call. The interview will take place after you have completed both questionnaires. During the interview the researcher will ask you about your interactions with the doctor's practice over the last 12 months and your own views of your wellbeing over the same time period. The interview will last between 30 and 60 minutes. You can stop the interview at any time. You can refuse to answer any questions we ask. You can have someone else with you when you talk to the researcher if you wish. With your permission, the interview will be audio-recorded to keep an accurate record of what has been said. If we're using a video call, we will not record video only sound using a separate recording device. You can switch off your camera any time.

How will my answers be used?

UHI researchers will analyse the anonymised data given in both questionnaires. If you have been interviewed as well, the interview recording will be turned into a text document or transcript. You can ask for a copy. The interview information will be analysed by researchers to pick out themes which will be written up in a report about the project. The report and research information may be used in articles for academic journals, conferences and presentations, but you will not be identified. Any quotations will be anonymous.

What will happen to my personal information?

All the personal information we collect will be kept confidential. UHI has strict rules to make sure that all information collected is safely stored and does not reveal personal information about you. All questionnaire data, research information, recordings, transcripts and consent forms will be kept securely on SharePoint, UHI's electronic filing system. Only the researchers will have access to them. Personal information such as your name and contact details will be destroyed after the evaluation has finished.

What are the possible disadvantages and risks in taking part?

There are no foreseeable risks associated with the research. The interviews are for research purposes only and will have no bearing on your individual health or wellbeing. If you do feel uncomfortable, upset or threatened in any way during an interview, please let the researcher know and he/she will stop the interview.

Who is carrying out this research?

The evaluation is being led by Professor Sarah-Anne Muñoz, Acting Head of the Division of Rural Health and Wellbeing at UHI. What if I want to withdraw from the evaluation?

You can tell the CLW or your GP surgery at any time. Alternatively, you can tell the researcher before or during an interview if you have one.

Your information will be used for the purposes of evaluating a community link worker scheme in the NHS Highland health Board area.
